2011 Program Performance (Homeownership Center)

- 203 Homes were purchased using Homebuyers Assistance funds.
- 71 Minorities purchased homes using Homebuyers Assistance funds.
- 8 Self-Help houses were completed
- 3 Acquisition rehabs were completed.
- 37 Owner occupied rehabs were completed.
- 33 Foreclosures were prevented through Housing Counseling.
- Individual Development Accounts (IDA's)
 - 14 Participants were able to purchase homes.
 - 12 Participants were able to open or expand a small business.
 - 7 Participants were able to pay tuition and purchase books to further their education.
 - 9 Participants were able to make repairs to their homes.
- Homelessness Prevention & Rapid Re-housing Prevention (HPRP)
 - 46 household were prevented from becoming homeless.
 - 20 Homeless families were placed into housing.

2011 Program Performance (Child Care Food Program)



- 32 Home daycares in 6 counties.
- 7 Daycare Centers.
- Average of 1,447 children receiving nutritious meals and snacks.

When provided nutritious meals and snacks, children are healthier and better able to learn.

Owning a Home strengthens families and causes them to feel a stronger identification with their community

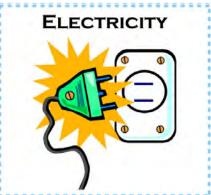
2011 Program Performance (Home Energy Assistance Program)

- \$1,476,362.49 was spent on utility assistance.
 - Average payment for Regular Assistance Program was \$141.12.
 - Average payment for the Crisis Assistance Program was \$230.76.
- 9,016 Families were assisted.
 - 6,740 Families were assisted with Regular Assistance.
 - 2,276 Families were assisted with Crisis Assistance.









Low-Income people continually make decisions between food, medicine and energy usage.

2011 Program Performance (Weatherization)

- 62 Homes were weatherized using Regular Department of Energy (DOE) funds.
- 96 Homes were weatherized using American Recovery & Re-Investment Act (ARRA) funds.





Weatherization conserves energy, enables people to be more comfortable in their homes and reduces spending of limited funds on utility bills.

2011 Program Performance (River Valley Regional Food Bank)

- The River Valley Regional Food Bank provided food to 203 participating agencies throughout seven counties who provided it directly to the hungry and undernourished.
- In FY 2011, over 4.7 million pounds of food was provided to the participating agencies.
- Tens of thousands of hungry and
 undernourished individuals received food from the River Valley Regional Food Bank.



Providing food for the hungry showed the community's compassion and rekindled in thousands hope for the future.

2011 Program Performance (Community Dental Clinic)

- 1,711 Patients were provided basic dental care.
- 36 Received dentures or partials.
- 45 Children were treated by a volunteer dentist.
- 2,854 Children were educated on basic care of teeth through the Tooth Fairy Program.
- 51 Homeless and very low-income persons received free prescription drugs.



Virtually all patients were in pain. Many had infections. We helped patients to function normally in their daily lives and, for some, at work.

The Community Dental Clinic turns despair into hope.

2011 Program Performance (Food Pantry)

- 475 Families assisted with food.
- 1,308 Individuals served within those families.
- 27,468 meals were provided with free commodities and purchase food.



Families destitute for food is a terrible thing.

2011 Volunteers & In-Kind Donations

The ability of C-SCDC to assist low-income persons/families is greatly extended by community volunteers who work in our programs and by in-kind donations to our programs.

- 1,587 persons volunteered in our programs during the year (duplicated).
- 6,626.25 non-professional and professional volunteer hours donated.
- \$8,577,870 was the value of In-Kind donations
